 - o Assess and take stock of different designs and target populations
 - o Distribution channels, uptake
 - o Should we refine hypotheses considering type/format of cash transfer?
 - Related dynamics of inclusion or exclusion of access and receipt incorporating the role of local community-based organizations and partners
 - o In kind vs unconditional transfers
